

# Calculus 1500A: Calculus I for the Mathematical Sciences (Fall 2020)

## Course Outline

### 1. Course Information

Class hours: Mon-Tue-Wed-Fri 8:30-9:30am, online via Zoom (synchronous)

**Prerequisites:** Ontario Secondary School MCV4U or Mathematics 0110A/B

**Antirequisites:** Calculus 1000A/B, Applied Mathematics 1413

Unless you have either the requisites for this course or written special permission from your Dean to enroll in it, you may be removed from this course and it will be deleted from your record. This decision may not be appealed. You will receive no adjustment to your fees in the event that you are dropped from a course for failing to have the necessary prerequisites.

### 3. Course Syllabus

This course is an enriched version of Calculus 1000A/B. We will cover the following topics:

- 1) Basic set theory, functions, an introduction to mathematical rigour, the precise definition of a limit.
- 2) Definition and properties of the derivative, derivatives of exponential, logarithmic, rational trigonometric functions, l'Hôpital's rule.
- 3) Definite and indefinite integrals, fundamental theorem of calculus, integration by substitution, applications.

## **5. Methods of Evaluation**

The overall course grade will be calculated as listed below:

15% assignments (online via WeBWork or Gradescope, one every 1-2 weeks)  
40% two midterm exams (online), each worth 20%  
45% final exam (online)

The final exam will either be a 30min online oral exam or a “written” 3h online exam. This will be decided before the end of September. In case of an oral final exam, students have to request scheduling changes (for instance, conflicts with other exams) within two weeks after the oral exam schedule has been posted.

### **Accommodated Evaluations**

In case of an excused absence for an assignment, the remaining assignments will be reweighted. For a midterm exam, either the remaining exams will be reweighted or a make-up exam may be offered, at the discretion of the instructor.

## 6. Accommodation and Accessibility

### Academic Consideration for Student Absence

Students will have up to two (2) opportunities during the regular academic year to use an on-line portal to self-report an absence during the semester, provided the following conditions are met: the absence is no more than 48 hours in duration, and the assessment for which consideration is being sought is worth 30% or less of the student's final grade. Students are expected to contact their instructors within 24 hours of the end of the period of the self-reported absence, unless noted on the syllabus. Students are not able to use the self-reporting option in the following circumstances:

- for exams scheduled by the Office of the Registrar (e.g., December and April exams)
- absence of a duration greater than 48 hours,
- assessments worth more than 30% of the student's final grade,
- if a student has already used the self-reporting portal twice during the academic year

If the conditions for a Self-Reported Absence are *not* met, students will need to provide a Student Medical Certificate if the absence is medical, or provide appropriate documentation if there are compassionate grounds for the absence in question. Students are encouraged to contact their Faculty academic counselling office to obtain more information about the relevant documentation.

Students should also note that individual instructors are not permitted to receive documentation directly from a student, whether in support of an application for consideration on medical grounds, or for other reasons. **All documentation required for absences that are not covered by the Self-Reported Absence Policy must be submitted to the Academic Counselling office of a student's Home Faculty.**
