3. Course Syllabus, Schedule, Delivery Mode

Description: An enriched version of Calculus 1000A/B. Basic set theory and an introduction to mathematical rigour. The precise definition of limit. Derivatives of exponential, logarithmic, rational trigonometric functions. L'Hospital's rule. The definite integral. Fundamental theorem of Calculus. Integration by substitution. Applications.

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Contingency plan for an in-person class pivoting to 100% online learning.

In the event of a COVID-19 resurgence during the course that necessitates the course delivery moving away from face-to-face interaction, affected course content will be delivered entirely online, either synchronously (i.e., at the times indicated in the timetable) or asynchronously (e.g., posted on OWL for students to view at their convenience). The grading scheme will not change. Any remaining

assessments will also be conducted online as determined by the course instructor.

Contact your instructor first. If academic accommodation for one quiz is granted by the course instructor or a faculty counsellor, then your mark for that quiz will be replaced by the average mark on your other quizzes, there will be no makeups for missed quizzes.

Assessments worth 10% or more of the overall course grade:

If academic accommodation for more than one missed quiz is granted by a faculty counsellor, then each other quiz will count for 15% and the excess quiz mark will be assigned to the final exam. There will be no makeups for missed quizzes.

Absences from Final Examinations

If you miss the Final Exam, please contact the Academic Counselling office of your Faculty of Registration as soon as you are able to do so. They will assess your eligibility to write the Special Examination (the name given by the University to a makeup Final Exam).

You may also be eligible to write the Special Exam if you are in a "Multiple Exam Situation" (e.g., more than 2 exams in 23-hour period, more than 3 exams in a 47-hour period).

Note: missed work can only be excused through one of the mechanisms above. Being asked not to attend an in-person course requirement due to potential COVID-19 symptoms is not sufficient on its own.
